Our Members

AIMS members represent the full spectrum of the marine surveying industry from international shipping, domestic commercial vessels, super yachts to recreational small craft. Members are qualified and experienced in their profession, with many joining the marine surveying profession following a maritime career as a seafarer or shore-based maritime role.

- Shipping Surveyors inspect, survey or examine marine vessels to oversee cargo loading and unloading operations, assess damage or may inspect or monitor the condition of the vessel or onboard cargo, machinery or equipment.
- Domestic Commercial Surveyors are accredited by Australian Maritime Safety Authority (AMSA) to undertake statutory surveys on domestic commercial vessels in accordance with National Law and Regulations.
- Recreational Vessel Surveyors undertake survey of recreational vessels on behalf of an owner, insurer or potential purchaser with the purpose of assessing the vessel's condition and/or value.

Chairman's Report

I acknowledge the traditional owners and First Nations peoples of the lands and waters upon which the AIMS and its members live and work, and pay respect to elders past, present and emerging.

The past year for The Australasian Institute of Marine Surveyors (AIMS) has been both challenging and rewarding. The management team responsible for day-to-day operations and maintenance of AIMS business — including membership, training, administration, financial management, advertising, promotion, development and systems — has experienced substantial change as previous General Manager, Stacey Taylor, and membership administration officer, Brett McCulloch, both vacated their positions.

As a result of these personnel movements, the AIMS employed CEO, Dr Eric Perez, to take the helm. Eric came to the AIMS with a track record of achievement in similar roles with industry organisations and has been hard at work from day one to finalise long-term programs, continue working on others and investigate new initiatives across a broad range of areas under the remit of his appointment. Eric is ably supported by Sue Brown, who now takes overall responsibility for training and provides additional backup in other areas. Sue and Eric are further supported by a network of specialist contractors and, of course, by the AIMS board.

Whilst the changes at management level have been challenging, the AIMS also celebrates the achievements of 2023. Growing the AIMS presence in New Zealand by fostering relationships with New Zealand marine and maritime bodies and regulators has made significant headway this past year – many thanks to NZ based board member Greg Marsden for his contributions and hard work in this space. I believe that following past unsuccessful attempts, the AIMS has set a course to truly become what it says in the name – Australasian.

Development and implementation of the Australian Grain Surveyors Assurance Scheme (AGSA) highlights the value of perseverance. The scheme was initiated under former CEO, Susan Hull, evolved and progressed by former GM Stacey Taylor, and finally signed into legislation under our current CEO. I would like to acknowledge the patient efforts of the AIMS Grain working committee, the AIMS management teams involved over the past few years, members who have provided their valuable input and the public service team at Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry who cooperatively worked through this to achieve a world-first outcome where a regulator and industry body have partnered in such a manner. Quite some achievement!

However, we must not let these achievements overshadow the work being undertaken by the Recreational Vessel Committee to create an industry recognised and approved insurance report format for use in the recreational vessel sector. Within the largely unregulated recreational sector, there are numerous other improvement projects underway, including a Standards proposal with the end game being something akin to a Roadworthy Certificate for boats.

Developing and implementing standards across all categories of marine surveying has always been a priority for the AIMS in efforts to provide assurance to those who rely upon marine surveyors' expertise. There are numerous projects currently underway to develop standards frameworks covering a diverse range of common marine

surveys and inspections, and I thank all those members who have given their time to assist with their development.

The AIMS has rapidly evolved, particularly over recent years, to become a respected representative body for marine surveyors; nonetheless, all the achievements are underpinned by sound financial management, and I am very happy to report that the AIMS finances maintain a positive position, providing a platform for future growth, greater industry recognition, better member benefits, and continuing success for both the Institute and its members.

The AIMS is primarily a representative body for our members, and as such, focuses on a number of ways to support members across the spectrum of marine surveying activities undertaken by our members. The areas identified broadly fall into the following categories:

- Engagement with current members through online platforms and face-to-face events.
- Engagement with potential members to demonstrate value of membership.
- Growth and expansion of membership domestically and regionally.
- Provide direct member benefits and resources with current relevance.
- Respond to member-identified opportunities for improvement.

- Lobby for changes or improvements to benefit AIMS members, like the development and implementation of the AGSA scheme, engagement with AMSA and MNZ to develop regional cooperation and reciprocity, development of industry standard reporting formats.
- Encourage regulator involvement with AIMS working committees and events.

AIMS Presence and Place

Develop and maintain a comprehensive online presence through a powerful website, providing a one-stop for membership, forum, resources for training and business, CPD identifiers and opportunities.

Promote the AIMS and the benefits of engaging with AIMS and its members.

Establish a succession planning team to bring forth future leaders and provide a pathway to board membership.

As the AIMS continues to mature, I believe the foundations laid by past executive and management and the dedication of the current board, CEO and his management team will see the AIMS expand further to become a world-recognised representative body. I thank my fellow board members for their efforts this past year and, on their behalf, want to acknowledge the hard work of the business management team and, most importantly, thank our members for their continuing support.

Recreational Survey Standards Committee

The role of the recreational survey standards committee is to consult on projects related to marine survey standards within the recreational survey sector.

Members join the committee for a specified period to fulfil the requirements of a project, the duration of which will vary dependent on the project outcomes. Each project has its own brief specific to the initiative.

The committee members act in an advisory capacity and contribute technical knowledge and expertise to the project. During this year, a project committee was formed to explore the development of standard forms and templates for use by marine surveyors within the currently unregulated recreational survey sector.

The committee's work is ongoing.

Training Committee

The AIMS has undertaken a review of training content for both our recreational as well as working boat qualifications to ensure the training content is relevant, fit for purpose and robust enough to provide students with the necessary knowledge, skills, and abilities to perform effectively as a marine surveyor in today's market as well as into the future.

The role of the Training Committee in the review is to provide consultative input, technical knowledge and expertise on marine surveyor training courses offered by the AIMS by reviewing the overall training suite and individual unit content currently offered, as well as identifying gaps.

Outcomes of the review will assist with ensuring that our marine surveyor training is meeting the current needs of the industry.

Government and Industry Representation


Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry – Accredited Grain Surveyor Assurance (AGSA) Scheme. AIMS celebrated the establishment of a landmark scheme in partnership with the Australian Government's Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF). The Accredited Grain Surveyor Assurance Scheme is the first time that government has engaged in such a way for such a program.

The AGSA scheme is a marine surveyor accreditation initiative involving the clarification and verification of the qualifications and experience required for marine surveyors to be accredited to perform bulk vessel surveys prior to the loading of grain.

The administration of the scheme and the ongoing accreditation and verification of marine surveyors under the scheme will be managed by AIMS. A list of accredited marine surveyors was published on the AIMS website, providing assurance for exporters and shipping companies in the sourcing of appropriately-accredited marine surveyors as per the requirements of the Export Control (Plant and Plant Product) Rules 2021

The implementation of the AGSA Scheme was the result of more than five years' work that was started by Susan Hull, former AIMS CEO, worked through by the previous General Manager, Stacey Taylor with support from the Board, and AIMS Grain Committee members who have freely given their time to attend meetings and discussions. AIMS also thanks and congratulates the team at DAFF for their cooperation and collaborative approach.

Membership continued to maintain steady growth throughout the year with a 2.3% increase in members from the 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023. AIMS still experienced growth overall, primarily within our Associate members with a total of 22 new members within this category over the 2022/23 period.

The below graph shows the movement in membership levels across each month of the 2022 membership year.


While membership growth is an important aspect of a dynamic organisation, AIMS recognises the importance of, and will continue to focus on, value recognition for all current members.

Providing members with a sound value proposition and professional recognition in return for membership is a strategic area of focus.

Certified Marine Surveyors

AIMS' Certification scheme continues to grow in recognition, with over 18% of members gaining Certification status by the end of the 2023 year. Certification is a level of membership granted by approval of the board, to those who possess a minimum level of marine survey qualifications and experience and also elect to:

- Provide yearly verification of Professional Indemnity Insurance held either personally or via their employing company.
- Provide evidence of professional practices in line with the requirements of an ISO9001 Quality Management System.
- 100% compliance with all requirements of AIMS continuing professional development policy.



 Strictly adhere to standards and ethical practices in line with the AIMS Code of Professional Practice.

The Certification scheme assists consumers in engaging a quality surveyor who not only holds a minimum level of experience but also elects to comply with minimum industry standards for ethical and professional practice. Through online and print advertising, contributions of editorials to industry publications, online promotion and in-person presence at industry events, AIMS continues to grow the visibility of the Certification brand throughout the industry.

Member engagement

The member engagement strategy for the year incorporated a mix of the online opportunities utilised widely throughout times of limited travel as well as a tentative return to some face-to-face activities.

Online, AIMS was able to provide the following opportunities for members and students:

- Online member forums an informal hour of coffee and conversation online, providing members an update and insight into Institute activities.
- AGSA scheme online forum member information session on the implementation strategy for the AGSA scheme.
- Student tutoring sessions online subject-specific tutoring sessions for currently enrolled students.

Auckland Boat Show 23-26 March 2023

AIMS was pleased to attend the Auckland Boat Show between the 23-26 March 2023. Stacey Taylor, former AIMS General Manager, and our NZ Board Representative Greg Marsden attended over the four days and enjoyed meeting local members and promoting AIMS and our members to the NZ boating community.

Sanctuary Cove International Boat Show 25-28 May 2023

AIMS partnered with the International Marine Certification Institute at the Sanctuary Cove Boat Show 2023. A massive four-day event and an opportunity taken to speak and network with members and non-member marine surveyors and IMCI representatives regarding vessel surveying issues.

An AIMS presence at this event was aimed towards increasing the visibility of the AIMS brand and its members to the public, and critically consumer awareness in the selection of a marine surveyor.

Building the visibility of the AIMS brand is an ongoing

strategic necessity involving the investment of time and money. While the return of investment is not always immediate, our investment is one that will pay off over time.

In a market where consumers are flooded with choice, building our brand presence is an important function of AIMS. The 2023 show attracted 47,000 attendees over the four-day period, the exposure of AIMS and its members was significant, and AIMS will be attending in 2024.



Training and Professional Development

AIMS continues to deliver specialised marine surveyor diploma and short courses catering to each sector of the marine surveyor industry. Many courses have pre-requisite requirements of existing maritime experience or, in the absence of, a strong industry mentor, in recognition of the foundation knowledge and skills required to support the technically specialised discipline of surveying.

All courses are offered via remote learning at a student's own pace, with assessor assistance available via online tutorials or one-on-one sessions. Assessments are comprised of short-answer questions, research topics, case studies and submission of survey reports. For the latter, students do require access to vessels to complete these tasks.

Diploma Courses

- Industry Diploma of Recreational Vessel Surveying

 prepares students with the knowledge to survey recreational vessels under 25m.
- International Diploma of Marine Surveying (Working Boats) – prepares students with the knowledge of surveying domestic commercial vessels under the National Law and Regulations.
- Advanced Diploma of Commercial Marine Surveying – prepares students with the knowledge of undertaking ship and cargo surveys and inspections.

Enrolments remained steady throughout the 2022/23 period, with a total of 104 new students enrolling across all diplomas. Demographically, students are situated broadly throughout the Australasian region, but there was a marked increase in new enrolments

in the Advanced Diploma of Commercial Marine Surveying.

Student enrolments are received from a mix of those currently working in another sector of the industry looking to transition into a marine surveying role to those working with a marine surveyor wanting to gain the qualification while under the mentorship of their employer.

The graph provides a visual representation of the spread of new enrolments over the past 12 months and total active students in each of the AIMS diploma


Short Courses

Students elect to undertake these courses as a stand-alone attainment, while others use these courses as a stepping stone to upgrade or a crosstraining opportunity.

Professional Development

Continuing professional development is the ongoing process of developing and documenting the enhancement of professional skills and knowledge. It is not an indicator of career experience, rather it's the opposite; that being the identification of knowledge and skills added as we enhance our careers.

AIMS encourages and supports members in achieving professional excellence through regular professional development activities. AIMS offers professional development training and opportunities to assist members and other interested parties to upskill or






cross-skill, expand their industry knowledge, and fulfill their requirements for ongoing continuing professional development compliance.

Formal training opportunities are offered through AIMS, with 24 marine surveying specific training units, as well as a diverse range of professional short courses encompassing information technology, business management skills, communication, finance, marketing and writing.

Members can participate in online forums, networking events and working groups through AIMS, as well as the plethora of professional development activities available throughout the wider industry.

Financial Report

The company has generated a surplus of \$43,895 for the 2022/23 financial year. As a not-for-profit organisation, AIMS cannot pay dividends or distribute profits to members nor build excessive cash reserves. The company does seek to maintain adequate cash reserves to conduct the operations and achieve the strategic objectives of the organisation and build cash reserves equivalent to 50% of yearly outgoings to secure financial stability.

Incoming

Overall income was in line with similar results for the previous financial year. Membership income decreased during the 2023 year by approximately 1.9%. Income from diploma and professional development courses deceased by 4.8%.

The following graph shows the breakup of overall revenue as a comparison for the last two years.

Outgoing

Expenses increased marginally year on year by 3%. Staff changes, including the recruitment of a new CEO and increase to full time hours of the AIMS Training and Professional Development Coordinator contributed to the increase.


